The city of Nashville is resilient. We've survived direct hits from tornadoes, historic flooding, bombings, viruses, economic downturns and continue to protect the city through all the hardship. What makes our case all the more challenging is the fact that all erstwhile stated incidents cause us to never get ahead in terms of budgets. We provide not just a service for Nashville, Davidson County but we support the entire mid region of Tennessee in terms of supported by HazMat and Fire when needed or requested. We have an aggressive training regime supported by HaFF and TEMA that requires our department to use a lot of our equipment to support these mutual aid and automatic aid calls as well as training, 92% of our budget goes

strictly towards personnel salaries. 4% goes towards utilities and incidental costs. Our budget is extremely tight to the point that it would take us up to 4 years to purchase this equipment outright, if at all. For the first time since before the flood of 2010 we felt like we would finally be able to get ahead in terms of budgeting asks from the city, but 2020 had other plans for us as well as the rest of the world with the tornado marching across the County, numerous riots and a bombing for Christmas. To that end we're hoping to be awarded funding to enhance and or replace non-functioning monitors to bring capabilities back to FEMA standards to support not just the city of Nashville but the State of Tennessee.

The Nashville Fire Department serves the Metropolitan Government of Davidson County for Nashville, Tennessee covering over 533 square miles, with a growing population of over 750,000 residents and swells to over 1,200,000 through the work week. We have 1150 personnel with 39 engines, 12 aerial ladder trucks, 4 heavy rescues, 2 HazMat trucks, staffed with up to 4 EMTs and/or Paramedics each as well as 28 ALS ambulances, 15 District Chiefs, and 2 mobile air trucks.

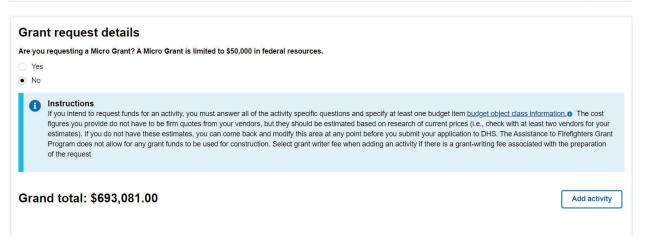

The Nashville Fire Department and The Nashville Firefighters IAFF Local 140 conducted an informal equipment risk assessment and have determined that we are in urgent need to replace Chemical, Biological, Radiological and Nuclear (CBRN) equipment that will allow us to become accredited to the FEMA Type 1 HazMat level. We are seeking \$263,500.00 to replace and purchase our outdated and or unworkable CBRN monitor equipment. Currently, our equipment is in such disrepair that we are unable to do basic monitoring for known or unknown chemicals when needed, especially in an Immediately dangerous to life or health (IDLH) atmosphere. Most of our equipment is at least 15 years old and we are no longer able to purchase replacement parts. The equipment that does function does not work as accurately as newer models and technology. This leads to firefighters being in the hot zone longer than they would be with the appropriate equipment. Nashville Fire Department has equipment to slosolete and/or out of compliance with current standards. While the equipment we

they would be with the appropriate equipment, Nashville Fire Department has equipment that is obsolete and/or out of compilance with current standards, while the equipment we currently have is operable, the technology is over 10-15 years old in most cases and some pieces older than that. Other pieces of equipment we currently have, have either been dropped, damaged or oversaturated affecting the motherboard, chips or displays to the point they are unusable. We responded to a large ammonia release this year and was unable to accurately determine the size of the plume and or the potency of the release, thus making the decision for evacuation to a neighboring residential area difficult. The equipment requested with this grant will be deployed on our two Haz-Mat companies that are full time Haz-Mat. From gas monitoring to "white powder" calls this equipment keeps us current with new standards. We are the largest full time Haz-Mat team in the middle region of Tennessee and respond regularly to the middle region in support of other agencies and departments. With these other agencies and departments requesting Nashville Fire CBRN/Haz-Mat we're all they have to respond to their incidents. Realizing that CBRN/Haz-Mat equipment is of medium need category, we cannot stress it enough that the region depends on our equipment, personnel and capabilities to respond to their areas of jurisdiction outside of Nashville.

92% of our working budget is in salary alone. the other 8% is broken up in maintenance, utilities, fuel, equipment, etc. We currently cannot afford to replace a colorimetric kit because our budget doesn't allow for the allocation. In recent years we have been seeking any and all help to enhance or replace our equipment due to damage or dated technology. We strive to find any and all help in obtaining or maintaining our front line equipment to support our responders, surrounding agencies and the public with shared costs through grant funding. The cost benefit is tremendous especially when keeping with current trends in population, call volume and resources limited in the region. Our budget is extremely tight. For example, to buy a simple sensor for a monitor which has a price of \$200 we sometimes have to wait for another quarter before we have the money to purchase something like that. In order to be compliant with the current standard as FEMA requires to be a Type 1 HazMat accredited team we really need the assistance in funding to better provide service for not just Metropolitan Nashville Davidson County but the middle region of Tennessee and possibly the entire State. The cost/benefit ratio of this equipment is found by the following equation: (Cost of equipment 15283 500 001 divided by the immediate response area population festimated 707 1321 (Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County divided by the entire State.)

[\$263,500.00] divided by the immediate response area population [estimated 707,132] (Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County) divided by the expected operational life of the equipment [10]; therefore, the cost/benefit ratio of this equipment is \$.04 per resident. Furthermore, if the total population of our mutual aid areas in which this equipment would be available to respond is calculated, the cost/benefit comes in at an amount well below a penny cost per citizen. We feel that this simple cost/benefit ratio, along with the equipment requested will provide the highest risk reduction potential at the least cost.

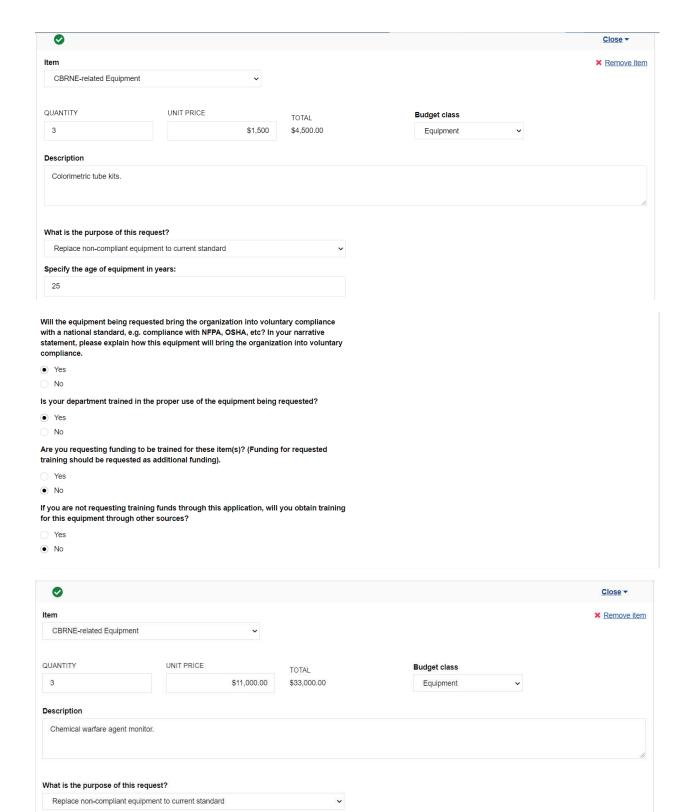

With the request for equipment it will greatly improve the safety of our responders but will also greatly improve the response and safety for the public by getting quick and effective public safety samples before sending samples to the State lab. It will also be of great assistance to our federal partners and the Joint Terrorism Task Force. The proposed investment meets the national priorities with the capabilities required across the whole community to prevent, protect against, mitigate, respond to, and recover from the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk. From a whole perspective, this investment adds new capabilities and

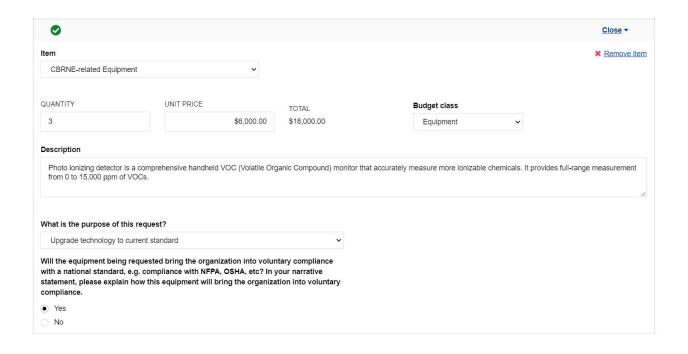

It will also be or great assistance to our federal partners and the Joint Terrorism Task Force. From a whole perspective, this investment adds new capabilities and enhances existing capabilities of the emergency services providers within the middle region of Tennessee and of Nashville. The capabilities include threat interdiction prior to casualties, protect further loss of life during an incident or event, mitigation of threats (individual aggressors/CBRNE/IED), and the ability of emergency services to provide continued services in the recovery phase of TSI and other catastrophic disasters with the potential for mass casualties. A new study from the University of Tennessee shows the population boom for the Mid-state is expected to continue, with over half a million people moving to Nashville in the next few years, with many population centers growing in all surrounding Counties to Nashville, Davidson County.

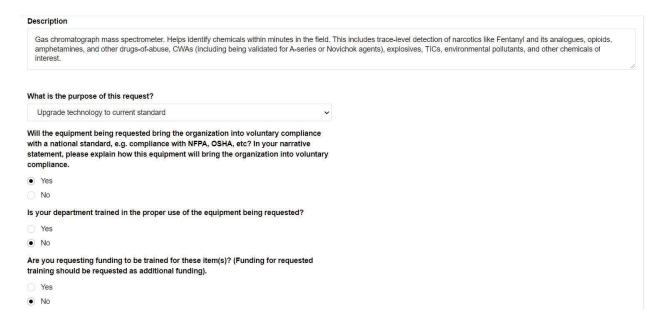

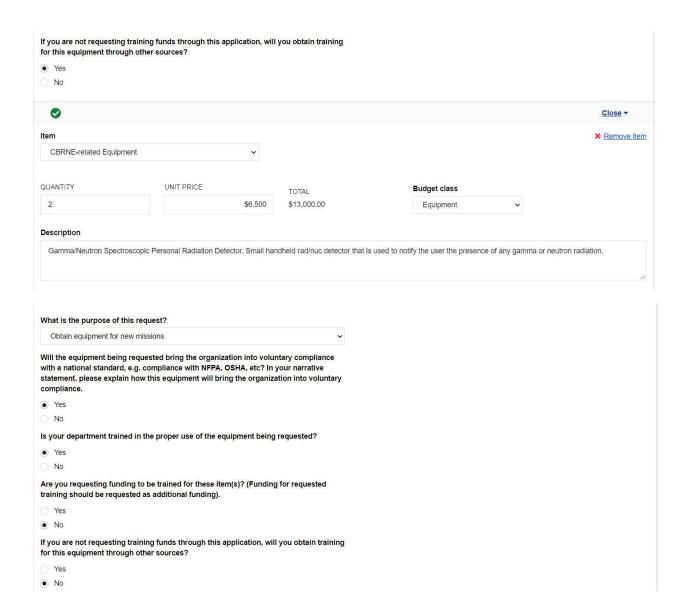

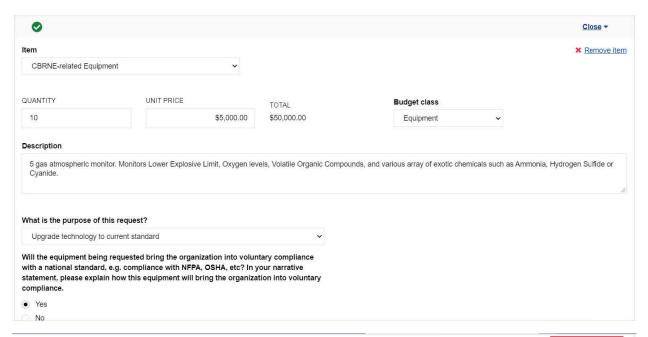

The Metropolitan Nashville and Davidson County Fire Department, referred to as The Nashville Fire Department, is located in Middle Tennessee and is a county wide fire department. We are seeking an Assistance to Firefighters Grant in the approximate amount of \$425,000.00 to help replace aged and broken exercise equipment that is over 15 years old in 29 of our fire stations. Also, included in this grant request if funding to train and certify a minimum of 30 of our employees as IAFF/IAFC PEER Fitness Trainers. Eleven of the forty stations when they were replaced now fall under the general services division of city government which manages repairs and upgrades to them. The City of Nashville was able to replace the equipment at 11 stations over the last 10 years as those stations were rebuilt and costs for new exercise equipment were covered under the construction cost. The City of Nashville currently only have plans to rebuild one additional station in the coming years and our only hope for this project and physical fitness of our members is through AFG funding. The twenty-nine stations that are referenced in this narrative still fall under the fire department operating budget and therefor any upgrades to the facilities or equipment must come from the operating budget of the fire

department. The Nashville Fire Department and IAFF Local 140 conducted an informal risk assessment and found a desperate need of updated exercise and wellness equipment. The Nashville Fire Department has seen a tremendous increase for calls for service in the last 10 years and are represented by an increase of 44% for service. 2021 is on pace to be one of the busiest in the history of the NFD with projected call total to be around 138,000 up from 100,777 in 2011.

The addition of modern equipment and well-trained mentors will help establish a workout program for the next generation to lean on while serving the needs of our current members. The new equipment will enable the user to train without fear of missing a workout safely and effectively because of broken down or unsafe exercise equipment. The Nashville Fire Department is always looking for ways to protect our employees while planning.

The unprecedented growth in the Middle TN area has created an increased strain on the budget the Nashville Fire Department. In doing so the physical demand has also grown on our personnel and the daily strain each of our members experiences only increases each day. As our call volume has increased dramatically over the last 10 years, claims for injuries have increased and shown the need for a better system of addressing our members physical, emotional, and psychological needs.

Since October 2011, the department has seen 197 knees, 201 shoulder and 266 back injury claims submitted by our members. The NFD safety office statistics show over \$6.1 million in these types of injury claims alone in the last 10 years. If injury claims were lowered by 10%, it will justify the grant cost. By accomplishing this goal, it will reduce financial losses to the Nashville Fire Department and our employees. These financial losses can lead to higher insurance premiums for the City of Nashville government and the individual employee. This investment of \$4.71 per employee will be small in comparison to lifelong benefits that are achieved from this upgrade of our exercise equipment. From the standpoint of population benefit, (\$425,000 divided by 707,132- and 7-year life expectancy), a per resident cost of \$.09 per taxpayer over the next 7 years. This math clearly shows a direct and manageable cost savings that will be seen for many years.

The NEPA reports 46% of firefighter deaths are caused from cardiovascular events and disease. American Heart Association reports that the average heart surriery can exceed

The NFPA reports 46% of firefighter deaths are caused from cardiovascular events and disease. American Heart Association reports that the average heart surgery can exceed \$200,000.00. The department has seen an increase in cardiac related claims. In the last 2 years, the department has had 4 members who had to have a heart related surgery. Tragically, one of our members after completing the physical agility test had to retire due to a heart blockage and soon after died from heart failure. Most of these issues were found during the annual physical assessment or physical evaluation by the health department. This also reinforces the fact that the investment in up-to-date cardiovascular equipment that can reduce the financial strain of heart related claims on the Nashville Fire Department.

After an equipment inventory, we found that much of the equipment currently has rust, worn cables or in a general state of disrepair. While researching ways to meet bring our equipment up to date, we found that finding parts is very difficult due to the advanced age of the equipment. This project would also serve as a motivator for our members to participate in a formal work out program. Our employees have resorted making their own fixes and addressing issues where possible. Many stations have equipment that was brought in by personnel just trying to make a difficult situation better. Any equipment fixes in recent years have been altempted by personnel using tape, amazon for treadmill parts, and many other homemade fixes. We often overlook the fact that when presented with a difficult, situation fire and EMS workers try to make the best of the situation. This is the case for the employees who are using old and worn equipment inside of the 29 fire stations throughout the City of Nashville. At station 12 for instance, when you enter the work out room that is a converted bedroom, you will notice the treadmill that has a worn belt that is slick and frayed. Recently, when the treadmill experienced a belt failure, a replacement belt was ordered by the crew at Station 12. The dumbbells have chunks missing from them and the grip has been worn smooth from years of use. In the corner of the room there is a multi-function trainer that is rusted and rocks unsteadily while

using it due to the legs being uneven. The weight bench has duct tape on the head portion of the flat cushion that is being used to fix the hole in the canvas material. This is a theme that is repeated throughout the city in every fire station. This funding would provide uniform equipment for use that is safe and will make for an effective exercise atmosphere.

Safety is a priority The Nashville Fire Department and are prioritized in numerous ways. First, all new employees are put through an initial medical screening process that follows NFPA 1582 and 1583 guidance. Second, all current field personnel are screened annually that is also in compliance with NFPA guidelines and is administered by our employee health section of the Metropolitan Nashville Health Department's medical physician. Third, an annual physical assessment test is done to ensure members are physically able to complete job related tasks. This is done by members participating in the Fireground Physical Ability Test and documented annual performance that can be compared from year to year. Fourth, the department now offers formal behavioral health and wellness services in a variety of ways. Employee Assistance Program (EAP) and mental health professionals are available to cater each employee's needs based on a diagnosis or substance abuse issue that may be present. Finally, just announced the Sarah Cannon Cancer Institute is going to be offering cancer screenings to our personnel at little to no cost to the employee. This is a voluntary program that is going to be catered to everyone needs based on of family history and current markers based on statistical data. This grant will help to ensure our members are able to train and prepare for whatever call for service may arise safely and effectively. With a tiered approach offering our members access to trained PEER trainers and up to date exercise equipment, we feel this best serve our members health as well as the safety of the public. Failure to prepare, is preparing to fail.

Personnel will have 24 hour a day access to work out plans and routines that are going to be developed by the PEER trainers to be delivered via email weekly. This will serve as a personal one on one resource for our employees to ask questions, be oriented on the new equipment, and have a direct line of communication for any needs that may arise.

In closing, let me express my gratitude for your consideration into this grant opportunity and the investment it represents in future of the members of the Nashville Fire Department. The citizens we serve and the many visitors we protect will also stand to reap the great benefits from this funding. This opportunity to bring our member's health and wellbeing to a new level of modernization will pay for itself with returns in improving the overall health of each employee. The Nashville Fire Department has made great strides in creating an atmosphere that

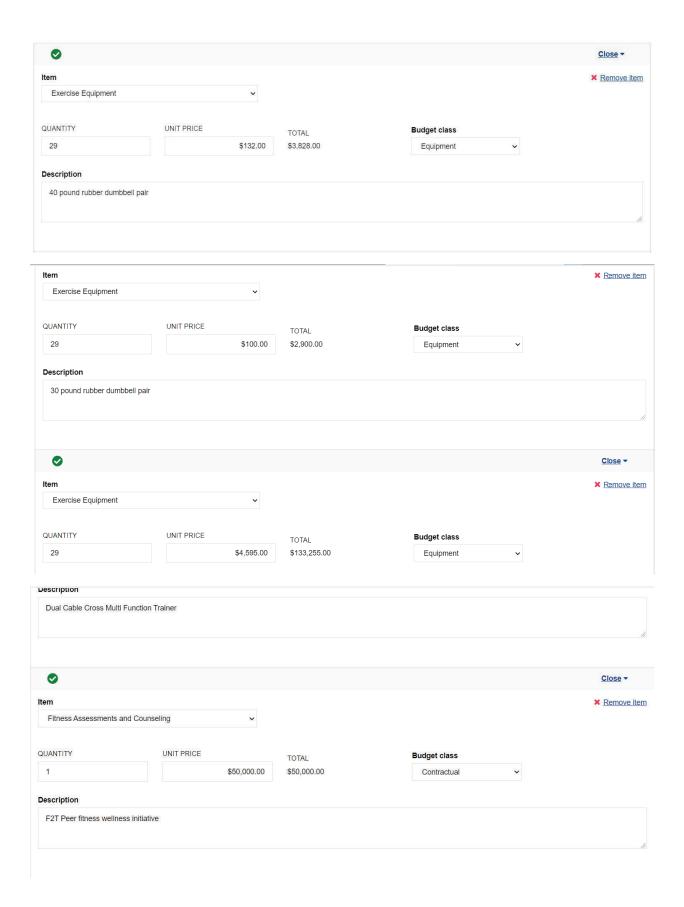
