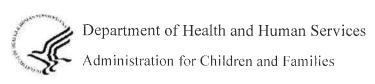

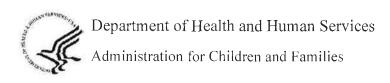

The Metropolitan Action Commission (MAC), a Department of the Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County, Tennessee, serves as the community action agency for Nashville and Davidson County. Its mission is to embody a spirit of hope, help children and youth develop their potential, equip adults and families to achieve their goals, improve social and economic mobility, and advance well-being for people and communities.

The program operates in a center-based model with no delegates or child-care partnerships and serves a total of 1365 in a total of 78 classrooms in seven centers. Head Start serves 1245 children ages 3-5 or school entry eligible, 120 inclusive of 120 Early Head Start children 6 weeks to three years, and 16 expectant mothers.

Metropolitan Action Commission Early Education (Head Start and Early Head Start) program, endeavors to enhance the health and safety in service delivery across its 7 centers and administrative office. MAC continues to engage in ongoing program planning related to additional COVID related needs and considered existing resources and additional needs which included PPE, sanitizing supplies, technology enhancements and equipment. A plan was developed for this second one-time funding opportunity with input by content

areas who examined specific areas of need and prepared plans for highest priority needs program wide. We've outlined below the goals and specifications for what we feel will offer a strong and mindful approach to continuing safe service delivery in childcare.

The Goals: This pandemic has shown all of us just how important the early learning and childcare sector is, but also the precarious nature of these businesses and the importance of healthy practices to prevent spread of disease. MAC Early Education began with setting a re-opening plan in place while monitoring the metrics in the community and the advice of the Centers for Disease Control, local public health authorities, and Metropolitan Nashville-Davidson County Government. We made the wellbeing of children, parents, and team members our priority. The following are important goals that we've identified:

1) Childcare Access. It is essential that families have access to quality childcare so adults can return to work and children can return to the safe learning environments and routines critical to their healthy development.

Returning children to care at MAC has occurred in a phased-in approach in August 2020 to limit the number of people first entering facilities and occupying classrooms, and then gradually built over time and is now about 80% on-site and 10% are either hybrid or all virtual as of March 1,

2021. The criteria used to determine who may access childcare first, next and so on was a critical decision that included priority needs such as parents who were working or in school during the day with no other options for child-care, children with IEP's and IFSP's (with diagnosed disabilities), and children deemed to have experienced other conditions. The financial ramifications of these were minimal for the agency as Office of Head Start continued full funding during the height of the pandemic and in the recovery period.

2) Health and Safety. A strategy for ensuring health and safety was a priority deemed fundamentally important. In the context of childcare, all persons accessing and working in the centers were urged to be mindful and honest about their health status and concerns. Procedures such as continuous screening at the door became a routine practice for all staff, children, and guests and the number of people accessing the building was limited. Access to support and resources from public health officials has been key in this endeavor. Masks, thermometers, gloves, enhanced cleaning, and sanitizing have become daily requirements. Staff were allowed to telework while in the virtual or hybrid operational phases to resist transmission of the virus. Strict COVID tracking and quarantine guidelines were implemented to manage those with primary or secondary exposure to COVID 19.

3) CARES (COVID) Budget Narrative/Methodology and Spending Plan:

Below is the itemized plan for expending the allocated amount because of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 for one-time activities in response to COVID-19. It is assigned based on the federal formula in relationship to program's funded enrollment as required by the appropriation.

Each Early Education (Head Start/Early Head Start) content area was asked to provide recommendations that would support the programmatic and health and safety needs in response to COVID response for related supplies, materials, and activities to be considered to prioritize the spending plan. It considered the following categories:

- Mental health services, supports, crisis response, and intervention services
- Coordination, preparedness, and response efforts with state, local,
 tribal, and territorial public health department, and other relevant agencies.
- Provision of meals and snacks not reimbursed by the US Department of Agriculture (USDA).
- Training and Professional development for staff on infectious disease management.

- Purchasing necessary supplies and contracted services to sanitize and clean facilities and vehicles.
- Other actions that are necessary to maintain and resume operation of the program, such as hiring substitute staff, investing in technology infrastructure, making improvements to air conditioning systems, or other emergency assistance.

Metropolitan Action Commission has determined as its priority areas of focus sanitizing and cleaning resources that will ensure health and safety of children, staff, and families, facilitation of communication and virtual engagement with children and families, technology and equipment for safe transport of children and food items, emergency preparedness that minimizes social contact and promote social distancing, and related training.

Cost Allocation Plan 2021-22

This is the cost allocation plan used to charge costs that are shared between the programs. The plan below supports the allocation of 75% HS and the 25% EHS for staff time that is shared between the programs. The total funded enrollment for our program is 1,365 students for HS and 120 students for EHS with a total funded enrollment of 1,365. Accordingly, 1,245/1,365 = 91.2% for HS and 120/1,365 = 8.79% for EHS. Since, these cost percentages changed less than 1% from previous years due to slight reduction in HS funded enrollment, it was determined that we would round up on the HS Percentages and round down on the EHS percentages based on our calculations below.

The Head Start program has children starting the 2nd week in August and runs through the end of May which represents 9.75 months. The Early Head Start Program is year round. In the cost allocation calculation above, HS requires 92% of the time during the weeks in session while EHS only requires 8%. When HS is not in session, EHS requires 100% of the time.

Travel is based on the labor distribution of each employee. The shared staff of HS and EHS uses the same logic above to share the cost of 75% HS and 25% EHS.

Costs for supplies and/or events that are shared between both HS and EHS are divided using the funded enrollment for each program (HS – 92% and EHS – 8%).

Costs for Utilities expenses for centers that have both HS and EHS children classrooms are shared using the ratio % based on the number of classrooms at each location.

About our agency...

The Metropolitan Action Commission is the designated community action agency for Nashville and Davidson County charged with eliminating the barriers of poverty with the ultimate goal of moving families out of poverty. Using a two-generation, whole-family approach as well as an integrated service model to build a system of care for families with limited incomes, we serve an average of 20,000 families. The agency is also recognized nationally for its early adaptation of 2Gen/Whole family approach and it's impact on families in moving them out of poverty.

Our Head Start and Early Head Start program is the largest provider of early childhood education for children birth to five in Davidson County. This program promotes school readiness for children from families with low incomes through education, health, social and other comprehensive services. Community Services provides high school equivalency/GED test preparation and college readiness classes and support. The agency also assists families with utility, mortgage and rent payments, prescription costs, utilities and rental deposits for residents, property tax assistance for senior citizens and youth programs through our Summer Food Service Program and our Summer Youth Technology Camp. Our Summer Cooling program provides air conditioning units at no cost to residents with medical conditions during months when the city historically experience extreme heat conditions. The MAC 4 Jobs Program provides workforce development initiatives to increase the earning potential of families within Head Start and Early Head Start programs.

Our agency employs an average of 310 staff at 8 locations throughout the county. We receive funding from The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, U.S. Department of Agriculture, the State of Tennessee, the City of Nashville and Davidson County and Piedmont Natural Gas. The board is comprised of 16 members (Commissioners) from the communities served by the agency as well as appointed members by the city Mayor.

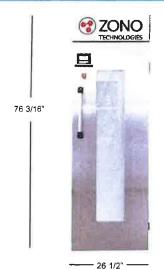


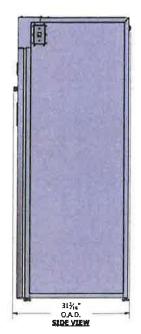

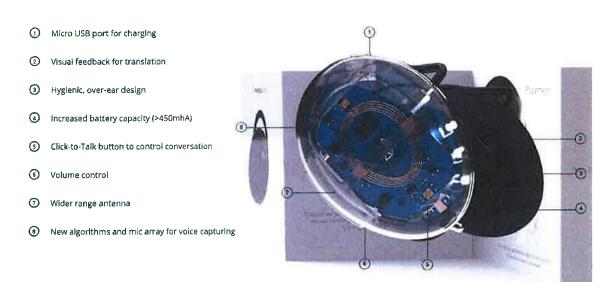

TRANSPORTATION COVID PLAN

Assessing the Need for Transportation

- It is imperative that Advocates ask families about their plan for getting their child to school to assess there is a need for transportation. It should be noted that the number of available seats on each bus have been greatly reduced and should be reserved for families without transportation.
- Encourage families to provide their own transportation to reduce overall transportation capacity challenges.
- Priority should be given to families without access to a private vehicle or those who face other obstacles in transporting their children to school.

Transportation Services for Children

- Minimize contact between bus drivers and monitors. If possible, stay at least 6 feet from other people.
- Make available and ensure the use of cloth face coverings and hand hygiene supplies.
- Conduct a health check of all children and staff before they board the vehicle. Do not transport individuals with a fever of 100.4°F (38°C) or above or who show other signs of illness. Do not transport individuals who have been in close contact (within 6 feet) of someone who has tested positive for, or is showing symptoms of, COVID-19.
- Bus drivers and monitors should be masked, and have the option of also having face shields, neither of which should obstruct the driver's vision.
- Bus Riders should board the bus wearing a face mask positioned over the mouth and nose while maintaining physical distancing. They should be issued a mask upon boarding if they do not have one.
- Bus riders should be asked to use hand sanitizer upon boarding.
- Bus riders should be directed to their assigned seat on the bus.
- Train bus monitors to use a non-contact thermometer.
- Position bus riders as far apart as possible, preferably 6 feet apart, with one child per bench seat. If children are coming from the same home, they may sit together. If possible, ensure children sit 6 feet away from the vehicle operator. They should be directed to their assigned seat on the bus.
- To minimize proximate interactions for the bus ride, riders who are first to exit the bus should be the last to board.
- If possible, keep class groups together on bus routes to minimize potential exposure between different groups of children.
- Use visual cues to help children understand the new protocols because children will not understand the need for physical distancing.
- Bus drivers and monitors should avoid touching surfaces often touched by bus passengers, to the extent possible. Staff should use gloves if touching surfaces contaminated by body fluids.

TRANSPORTATION COVID PLAN

Clean Vehicles Between Each Use

- The bus should be cleaned and sanitized before and after each route is driven with approved cleaning solutions. Thoroughly clean and disinfect commonly touched surfaces.
- Staff should ensure there is adequate ventilation when using products to prevent children or themselves from inhaling toxic vapors.
- For hard and non-porous surfaces inside the vehicle (e.g., hard seats, arm rests, door handles, light and air controls, doors, windows), clean with detergent or soap and water if the surfaces are visibly dirty, prior to disinfectant application.
- For seatbelts, and other child safety restraints, programs must employ methods and products that are effective on COVID-19 and safe for use with the restraint system, particularly seatbelt webbing. Chlorine- or ammonia-based solutions may cause deterioration of safety restraint components and cannot be used. For cleaning guidelines, consult the vehicle or restraint system manufacturer.
- For soft or porous surfaces (e.g., fabric seats), remove any visible contamination and clean with appropriate cleaners indicated for use on these surfaces.
