

## Metropolitan Nashville and Davidson County, TN

## **Legislation Text**

An ordinance authorizing The Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County to accept a new public sanitary sewer manhole, for property located 400 Hume Street, also known as Tennyson Germantown (4th and Hume) (MWS Project No. 23-SL-224 and Proposal No. 2024M-019ES-001).

WHEREAS, the acceptance of one sanitary sewer manhole. for property located at 400 Hume Street, also known as Tennyson Germantown (4th and Hume), is needed to construct project number 23-SL-224; and,

WHEREAS, the Metropolitan Planning Commission approved mandatory referral No. 2024M-019ES-001 on January 25, 2024, for the acceptance of said sanitary sewer manhole.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE METROPOLITAN GOVERNMENT OF NASHVILLE AND DAVIDSON COUNTY:

Section 1. The Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County is authorized to accept one sanitary sewer manhole, for property located at 400 Hume Street, also known as Tennyson Germantown (4th and Hume), as shown on Exhibit 1, which is attached hereto and incorporated by reference.

Section 2. The Directors of Water and Sewerage Services and Public Property Administration are authorized to execute such documents as may be necessary and appropriate to carry out the acceptance authorized by this ordinance.

Section 3. Amendments to this legislation shall be approved by resolution.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its final passage, the welfare of The Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County requiring it.

## <u>Analysis</u>

This ordinance accepts one sanitary sewer manhole for property located at 400 Hume Street, also known as Tennyson Germantown (4th and Hume).

This ordinance has been approved by the Planning Commission. Future amendments to this ordinance may be approved by resolution.

Fiscal Note: This ordinance has no cost to Metro. Abandoned easements have no market value according to the Department of Water Services.
