Important Heal The Healers Grant Information

Eligibility Requirements / Qualifying Applicants

The Heal the Healers Fund considers grant requests from governmental and non-profit professionals working directly with survivors of sexual or domestic violence and child abuse in the US. This includes professionals such as: law enforcement working on special victims cases, SAFE nurses, therapists, victim advocates, prosecutors, crisis hotline workers, etc. We realize that many agencies and professionals fit these criteria and therefore we ask that organizations must be certified as tax exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code or use a fiscal sponsor with 501(c)(3) tax status. Public entities such as Tribal Governments, police departments, and prosecutor's offices are also eligible. The Heal the Healers (HTH) Fund Grant program does not make grants to individuals.

Heal the Healers Fund grants are **NOT** available for general operating support (staff salaries, rent, utilities, etc.), fundraising events, or endowment funds.

Funding Amounts and Duration

Grant sizes vary but typically range from \$1,000 to \$5,000 (maximum) and organizations should make clear in their application how that grant will benefit their colleagues and enable them to continue to provide support to survivors. The grant period is up to one year from the award date. A final report (via a template provided by the Foundation) is required and due no later than 30 days following the project completion date.

In addition to the financial support, grantees will also be invited to join a peer learning community cohort that includes:

- virtual peer to peer networking opportunities;
- virtual training/presentations by leading healers, therapists and other professionals with expertise in cutting edge vicarious trauma, empowerment, leadership and therapeutic modalities;
- and opportunities to amplify their fellowship/cohort experiences to inspire others in the field.

Areas of Support

The Joyful Heart Foundation has established the following guidelines for its Heal the Healers Fund grants to support those working directly with survivors in the following areas.

1. **Training and/or program development** on self-care practices such as training in trauma-informed yoga, breathwork, somatic therapy, etc.
2. **Small capital items and equipment** that specifically allow staff and volunteers to address their self care needs such as daylight lamps for staff or new furniture for a break room.
3. **Staff activities** to build and support connections between colleagues such as, trust building experiences, monthly pizza nights, or bagel Fridays.

NOTE: While consulting/training services and other costs related to the proposed project are welcome, these small grants are not intended to support staff salaries/positions such as hiring a new position, covering staff hours, etc.

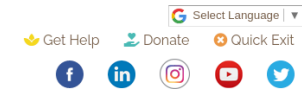

What is your organization's mission statement?

The mission of the Metropolitan Nashville-Davidson County Office of Family Safety is to increase victim safety and offender accountability. The Office of Family Safety provides vital crisis intervention services to victims of interpersonal violence while maintaining the emotional wellness of service providers. This Mission is accomplished in our court and in community-based Family Safety Centers through client advocacy, training, outreach, and multidisciplinary teams and Family Safety Center collaboration

Please share a short narrative describing your organization's work in support of survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, and child abuse.

The work of the Office of Family Safety's advocates and high-risk case managers provides several services in support of survivors of interpersonal violence. These services are free and available to any survivor of interpersonal violence, and advocates and case managers support survivors of domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, and human trafficking. Services they provided include, but are not limited to, safety planning & needs assessments, danger assessments, creation of orders of protection, crisis intervention, liaison with the Tennessee Department of Children's Services, emergency food assistance, support groups, and referrals to volunteer attorneys, counseling, transitional housing, and police assistance.

Advocates are stationed at both the Jean Crowe Advocacy Center, the Office of Family Safety's court-based family justice center, and the Family Safety Center, the community-integrated family justice center. These advocates saw 10,165 clients in 2025, providing 1,481 orders of protection and 4,269 safety plans. The advocates would conduct 6,714 visits with clients, of which 654 of these visits were for children. The Office of Family Safety's case managers would provide long-term support to 1,207 clients flagged as high risk. These case managers would conduct 30,336 visits to these clients, provide 6,260 safety enhancements, and support 220 clients in court.

The advocates and case managers also provide important referrals to community partners. These referrals include but are not limited to services that provide emergency shelter and housing, transportation, counseling, forensic interviews, sexual assault services, legal aid, and police support from the Metro Nashville Domestic Violence Division.

Please share a short narrative describing the populations your organization serves.

The Office of Family Safety (OFS) serves any resident of Davidson County and the Nashville metro area who is a victim of interpersonal violence. The Office of Family Safety's clients are primarily the victims of domestic violence, sexual assault, child abuse, and human trafficking. As a department of Metro Nashville and Davidson County, the Office of Family Safety is the primary local government organization that facilitates collaborative community efforts among non-profits, government, law enforcement, and private citizens to address interpersonal violence in the OFS's jurisdiction.

The Office of Family Safety's clientele falls within various cross-sections of minority and at-risk communities, who, without our coordinated and centralized services, may not normally get the care and security they need. For instance, of the 888 clients who were given services at one or both of our Family Justice Centers, 42% were either Hispanic or African American, 35% were below the poverty line, 20% had schooling below high school, 25% had children under 18 years old, and 80% were women. These categories put most of OFS's clients in various cross-sections of populations that often do not have the resources to address these crisis issues, which would put them at a higher risk of domestic violence escalating, and inevitably prevent any amount of accountability of offenders.

As a department created in 2015 to address these problems and help these communities, the Office of Family Safety continually reaches out to help these communities and populations.

What is the reason or need for grant request?

The advocates and case managers of OFS support a population of over 763,000 residents in the Davidson County area and are a leading organization for new programs in the state of Tennessee. The Office of Family Safety operates within a set of core values: dependability for our clients, empowering them to meet their needs, and always working to a level of excellence that our clients require. As such, OFS advocates and case managers go the extra mile to meet their clients' needs. The cost of this dedication and hard work is the emotional, cognitive, and physical toll that comes with witnessing survivors' stories and the empathetic engagement necessary to do this work. The Office of Family Safety is always looking for more ways to promote and support self-care mechanisms and techniques to help these advocates and case managers. However, like any professional, self-care can be difficult in an environment that sees, on average, 847 clients per month.

This grant would facilitate efforts to promote mental, physical, and emotional self-care through a planned retreat offering a choice of comprehensive services and activities to support this care. This retreat would also be used as a way to teach case managers and advocates on how to enhance their self-care routines for future use.

How will this will funding support your staff and survivors you serve?

As the primary sources of services for the victims of interpersonal violence in the city of Nashville and residents of Davidson County, the advocates and case managers experience a great deal of vicarious trauma. The effects of vicarious trauma can be profound and extremely detrimental not only to the health of the worker but also to the ability to provide services to a victim. Vicarious trauma increases anxiety, can

lead to chronic exhaustion, and can create symptoms not dissimilar to major depressive or persistent depressive disorders.

These effects inevitably lead to diminished concentration, memory loss, and lower professional confidence, significantly reducing their ability to help victims in crisis. This funding will be used to mitigate the effects of these symptoms and provide the tools necessary for advocates and case managers to alleviate future stress and anxiety that is a part of vicarious trauma. The consequences will create a more productive and resilient advocate and manager who can provide the services clients need, which may be the difference between safety and catastrophe.

This supports the vital frontline workers of the Office of Family Safety, increases the likelihood of meeting clients' needs, and, overall, increases the community's confidence that the department can provide the help needed.

Please state a brief yet compelling summary of the purpose of the request and activities to be supported and how this project is supported by the leadership of your organization/agency.

The primary purpose of this request is to assist in funding a one-day mental health retreat for the advocates, case managers, and other workers of the Office of Family Safety who work with victims of interpersonal violence. This retreat will be built to not only provide a day of rejuvenating and fulfilling activities that will help mitigate the symptoms that come from vicarious trauma but also teach these vital employees new and effective self-care techniques, methods, and tools that can keep them resilient, confident, and empowered.

This retreat will take place at one of a number of locations, including Camp Widjiwagon, a YMCA camp located by the J Percy Priest Reservoir, or Evins Mill. Both areas offer a pristine, idyllic location for decompression. The YMCA's leadership lodge features classrooms, an outdoor recreation area, and a great room for large meetings and meals. These camps also offers various recreational activities, including canoeing, sports fields, indoor pursuits, and hiking trails. There, the Office of Family Safety's executives will organize and provide a day of decompression, community, and well-being. The leadership of OFS will organize breakfast and lunch catered meals provided by local businesses, choosing the best option to best facilitate satisfaction and holistic health.

Following breakfast, the leadership will facilitate speakers from the local Nashville area who are subject-matter experts in their fields to speak to our advocates and case managers on key success factors, healthy

practices to prevent burnout, and advice for both personal and professional growth. After these speakers and classes, the retreat will feature a number of events designed to promote emotional and physical well-being, allowing participants to choose which they find most helpful. Planned events include a yoga class held in one of the facility's outdoor areas, followed by a sound bath. Chair massage therapy, offered by the facility or a local business, will be provided upon request. Activities that facilitate healthy creative outlets will be provided to give participants variety and choice in fulfilling activities.

After these planned events, participants will be provided with a catered lunch. Once lunch is concluded, time will be set aside for participants to have free time to explore the trails and facilities, utilize one of the various fields or indoor amenities offered, or participate in one of the activities offered in the location.

The leadership and staff who r plan and facilitate this retreat will plan all amenities and events around the recommendations, desires, and input of the advocates. Ultimately, the Office of Family Safety aims to create a positive, supportive, and collaborative environment for its hardworking advocates. That is why the Office of Family Safety requests these funds in the interest of our advocates and social workers and clients, and in the sincere belief that the excellence of our organization comes from believing we are all one team.
