A resolution accepting a DNA Capacity Enhancement for Backlog Reduction (CEBR) Program grant from the U. S. Department of Justice to the Metropolitan Government, acting by and through the Metropolitan Nashville Police Department, to outsource sexual assault kits to private vendors for forensic case sample analysis to reduce the backlog associated with DNA analysis.

WHEREAS, the U. S. Department of Justice has awarded a DNA Capacity Enhancement for Backlog Reduction (CEBR) Program grant in an amount not to exceed \$250,000 with no cash match required to the Metropolitan Government, acting by and through the Metropolitan Nashville Police Department, to outsource sexual assault kits to private vendors for forensic case sample analysis to reduce the backlog associated with DNA analysis; and,

WHEREAS, it is to the benefit of the citizens of The Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County that this grant be accepted.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE METROPOLITAN GOVERNMENT OF NASHVILLE AND DAVIDSON COUNTY:

Section 1. That the grant by and between the U. S. Department of Justice, in an amount not to exceed \$250,000, to the Metropolitan Government, acting by and through the Metropolitan Nashville Police Department, to outsource sexual assault kits to private vendors for forensic case sample analysis to reduce the backlog associated with DNA analysis, a copy of which is attached hereto and incorporated herein, is hereby approved, and the Metropolitan Mayor is authorized to execute the same.

Section 2. That the amount of this grant is to be appropriated to the Metropolitan Nashville Police Department based on revenues estimated to be received and any match to be applied.

Section 3. That this resolution shall take effect from and after its adoption, the welfare of The Metropolitan Government of Nashville and Davidson County requiring it.

Project Description

In May 2015, the Metropolitan Nashville Police Department (MNPDP) opened a crime laboratory, becoming the first local laboratory in the State of Tennessee. Also in 2015, the State of Tennessee enacted legislation requiring 100% testing of sexual assault kits. This piece of legislation coupled with Davidson County's consistent influx of new residents has

directly impacted the volume of sexual assault kit submissions for DNA testing at the Metropolitan Nashville Police Department Crime Laboratory (MNPDC-CL). The increase in sample and case submissions has negatively impacted backlog reduction and turnaround time.

The MNPDC-CL is committed to continuous improvements and efficiency and has made every effort to obtain updated technology in automation, chemistries, and adequate staffing levels to meet the high demands of forensic DNA testing.

The MNPDC-CL Forensic Biology Unit's staff consists of two (2) Forensic Supervisors, one (1) DNA Technical Leader, eight (8) Forensic Scientists, and one (1) Forensic Technician. Of the 12 total staff, there are eight (8) staff in various stages of training.

If this grant funding is awarded, the MNPDC-CL Forensic Biology Unit plans to use this funding to outsource sexual assault kits. This will aid in MNPDC-CL's goal of providing forensic DNA analysis of superior quality in a timely and efficient manner, decrease and eliminate the backlog, increase throughput, and reduce turnaround time.

Any materially false, fictitious, or fraudulent statement to the federal government related to this award (or concealment or omission of a material fact) may be the subject of criminal prosecution (including under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or 1621, and/or 34 U.S.C. 10271-10273), and also may lead to imposition of civil penalties and administrative remedies for false claims or otherwise (including under 31 U.S.C. 3729-3730 and 3801-3812).

Should any provision of a requirement of this award be held to be invalid or unenforceable by its terms, that provision shall first be applied with a limited construction so as to give it the maximum effect permitted by law. Accreditation must be by a nonprofit professional association of persons actively involved in forensic science that is nationally recognized within the forensic science community. The recipient shall ensure that any laboratory that conducts forensic DNA analyses under this award undergoes external audits, not less than once every two years, that demonstrate compliance with the Quality Assurance Standards for Forensic DNA Testing Laboratories established by the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The recipient shall ensure that all eligible forensic DNA profiles obtained with funding under this award will be entered into the Combined DNA Index System (CODIS), and, where applicable, uploaded to the National DNA Index System (NDIS). No profiles generated with funding from this award may be entered into any non-governmental database without prior express written approval from BJA. If any government-owned forensic laboratory that will receive funding under this award to conduct forensic DNA analyses is not a member of NDIS, the laboratory must have a written agreement in place with an NDIS-participating laboratory for the resulting eligible forensic DNA profiles to be entered into CODIS, and, where applicable, uploaded into

NDIS. If the recipient operates a state-designated DNA database laboratory, the recipient shall ensure that analyses of DNA database samples and reviews of associated DNA profiles conducted with funding under this award are performed by a laboratory that (1) is accredited by a nonprofit professional association of persons actively involved in forensic science that is nationally recognized within the forensic science community; and (2) undergoes external audits, not less than once every two years, that demonstrate compliance with the requirements of the Quality Assurance Standards for DNA Databasing Laboratories established by the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. The recipient shall ensure that any DNA analyzed with funding under this award are analyzed using commercially available PCR kits accepted by NDIS. The recipient shall also ensure that all DNA profiles obtained from DNA database samples with funding from this award are entered into CODIS within a reasonable timeframe of completion of analysis and uploaded into NDIS. The recipient agrees to notify BJA promptly upon any change in the accreditation status of any of the forensic science laboratories that receive funding under this award, or their participation in NDIS.

No research; nonsupplanting of State or local government funds

The recipient shall ensure that none of the funds provided under this award are used for research or statistical projects or activities as defined by 28 C.F.R. 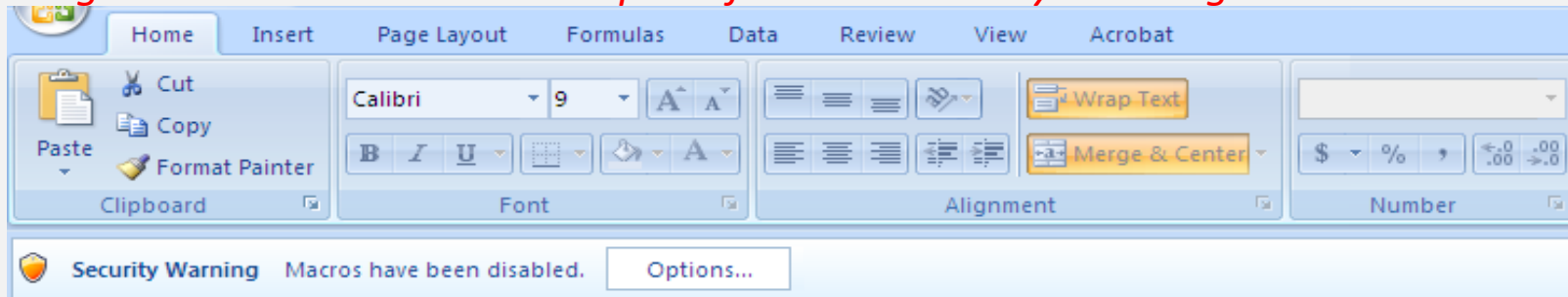
